What a brilliant day! It meant a 5:30am start on a brisk April morning to sort out our little boy Alex (5 months) before driving the 1.5hr to Eastern Creek. Having never been to Eastern Creek before, Fiona and I were pleasantly surprised by the setup of the training rooms and viewing platforms over the figure 8 track were excellent. We even scored a little side room to dump all our baby stuff and give Alex a guiet place to sleep.

But of course the best bit was the driving and watching others drive. Once again this was a new experience for me — never been in a motorkhana before, but often wondered what it was all about. So for the benefit of those in a similar position, here's a quick summary of the day's events:

A verbal training session in the rooms by the Eastern Creek guys discussing the pros and cons of ABS, ASC+T, DSC, tyre pressures, etc (quick panic from yours truly when I realised I only had 26psi on my MCS!).

Two cars at a time around the figure 8 skid-track (run in circuit mode rather than figure 8). The sprinklers



were running the whole time (until the water temporarily ran out), so traction was very loose ... Not helped by the fact the instructor in the passenger seat delighted himself with switching ASC/DSC on and off or vanking the handbrake at the most inopportune times. I'm already grinning like a Cheshire cat at this stage.

With the waterworks on the figure 8 track stuffed (temporarily) we moved over to the skid pan (fully watered) this time with water that ran across the gently sloping concrete surface. Started with a big right-hand loop, like a roundabout. It was a great opportunity to learn how to throttle steer the MINI, backing to and fro from understeer to oversteer without needing to adjust the steering wheel. Great fun!

Still on the skidpan, they set up a slalom course to practice those standing

starts (lots of heroic wheel spin), easing on and off the throttle going round the hats, followed by a park in a 'garage' (no hard walls, just a set of witch's hats marking the corners).

I think that was about it for the 'training' and we then stopped for lunch. Not bad ... salad and ham rolls with soft drinks, teas and coffee, and fresh fruit.

Now back onto the track for the motorkhana events. We split into two groups between the two training areas. On the figure 8 track we raced one at a time doing three timed laps. The scores were based on 'split' times rather that 'fastest' times (ie. the difference between the lap times was what counted). so consistency was the most important thing here. On the skid-pan there were three stages. Slalom course, a clover leaf, and finally a wider slalom with a round-about and garage

park (bonus points for a reverse park). That took us the rest of the afternoon.

The instructors were in the passenger seat every time offering advise along the way (brake, brake! BRAKE!!!), and helping out with a little handbrake when it was needed (reverse parking!). The fastest we went all day would have been about 70kmh in second gear. It was gentle on speed but exhilarating due to the slippery conditions.

I think most would agree that the day was better than we could possibly have expected. I had an absolute ball and it took me ages to get to sleep that night, I couldn't stop thinking about big handbrake turns and powering on through massive oversteer. Fun fun fun!

clubMINI track report



clubMINI

15-16 October 2005



May 2005: I get a call from Stu Jones, 'Robbo, have you heard of the AROCA 6 hour race? It sounds like a lot of fun. I'm trying to get a MINI team together, are you in?'. I'm thinking to myself 'that sounds like fun!'

3:50pm Sunday 15th October 2005: I'm in my MINI race car, having just come out of the pits. I'm on hard compound semislick race tyres which are stone cold, and have very little grip. There is torrential rain. I'm heading down the straight of Eastern Creek at 180kmh, and I can barely see a thing due to the spray from the track. As I approach turn one I see a rapidly closing lotus about to overtake me on the inside. I'm thinking to myself 'Help! How did I get into this situation!' However, I made it through the turn, and 10 minutes later had the honour of crossing the finish line, taking the chequered

flag, and successfully completing the last leg of the 6 hour race for the clubMINI team.

This is the story of the clubMINI entry in the AROCA 6 hour endurance race.

The 6 hour race is run every year by the Alfa Romeo Owners Club (www.alfaclubnsw.org.au). The race is run over a 2 day weekend with qualifying on the Saturday, and the race on the Sunday. The race itself runs for 6 hours, as a relay type event. It is often thought of as 'The Bathurst' of club racing. Each team has one car on the track at a time. A 'baton change' is performed when a car pits, and a new team car goes onto the circuit. There are 2 concurrent competitions, 'Outright' which is the team that has covered the most distance at the end of 6 hours, and 'Handicap' which is based on nominated lap times, and rewards consistency. To enter, cars need to be a CAMS log-booked race-car, which means roll cages, harnesses and all the safety gear.

When Stu suggested entering the race, with a MINI team, I thought it was a fantastic idea. The only problem, we only had my car and Stu's, and we needed at least 3 cars. Stu made some calls to our Queensland friends lain and Grant Sherrin from the Sherrin Racing Team (http://sherrinracing. com.au). Stu and I have competed against the Sherrin's and their 2 MINIs in numerous rallies. The Sherrin's were keen, and agreed to ship the cars down from Queensland for the event. We had a team!

Neither Stu nor myself, or anyone from the club had any experience with this kind of event before. Therefore we decided to team up with the NSW BMW Club (www. bmwclubnsw.asn.au) who have entered this event many times. They were entering 2 teams, and we decided to pool resources and make the most of their experience.

We also needed some helpers on the day. The helpers are required to time laps, signal to drivers from the pit-lane, refuel, help scrutineering and co-ordinate drivers etc. This is where our team captain Alan Earnshaw came to the rescue, and agreed to organise volunteers from clubMINI.

After several administrative alitches the weekend of the race arrived, and the team came together at the Eastern Creek circuit. The Sherrin's cars arrived from Queensland, with Donald their mechanic. Saturday was a busy day, with administrative paperwork, scrutineering and driver and team briefings. Qualifying went well, with all 4 MINIs setting competitive times, and meeting all requirements to qualify for the event. We felt a little 'outgunned' in our MINIs. All of our cars are road registered and road legal. However, the vast majority of the cars in the race were nonregistered race specials.

On the Sunday morning the team of clubMINI volunteers looked resplendent in their clubMINI motor sport uniforms. We were blown away by the support given by the Club members, with over 20 volunteers turning up and helping during the day. Alan was busy coordinating and assigning tasks, and all volunteers were kept busy during the day.

The clubMINI team drivers were all very nervous on the race morning, with none of us ever having

raced in this kind of event before. However, when the start time came, everything seemed to come together. The MINIs ran beautifully with no mechanical problems, all drivers drove well doing competitive

and consistent times. The clubMINI team of volunteers was amazing, with everything running smoothly without a glitch. The rain came late in the day, which made things interesting, but everyone performed their roles well. At the end of the race everyone was relieved to have made it through with no mechanical dramas. The clubMINI team had done well, coming 12th out of 24 outright, and 6th out of 24 in the handicap. This is a great result,

considering it was our first year, and that we were competing against some true race cars!

Stu and I would like to thank the Sherrin's for being great team mates and driving so well. Donald their mechanic, and the boys from Peak Performance were also a great help during the day, helping sort our minor problems. The volunteers from the BMW club were fantastic, and we learnt a lot from them.

However, most of all, we would like to say a huge thankyou to the many volunteers from clubMINI. Alan and his team were fantastic throughout the weekend. There were too many people to name individually, but they all did a fantastic job, especially considering it was our first event. Many of the other teams commented on how well organised and professional our clubMINI volunteers were, which is a big compliment coming from experienced teams! Thankyou to everyone who helped out during the weekend.

Hopefully, we may have mini entry next year, and do it all again!


the high country drive was full of MINI roads and the driving aspect was superb.

coloured MINIs looked like a pack of Smarties driving down the road?) made it safely to each check point, whoops I mean eatery or craft shop.

We landed in Jindabyne and found the best café in town for more food and some fuel for the MINIs.

The next leg of our journey would be a great drive too, over the Snowy Mountains via the Alpine Way, sealed all the way these days, it provides a superb drive and the roads were quiet and the skies blue as we headed for Victoria. Our two Cabrios were topless through the mountains

After lunch, on the way up the Murray Valley Hwy there was a short spate of car swapping as Helen and then Bill experienced the power of a JCW over their standard Cooper. One thing is for sure, if you ever travel with Helen, don't expect to get the chance to talk to her, you just sit there and listen, alternatively Bill is very quiet and was a good passenger who needed the occasional prompt to utter a few words, must be a result of sitting with Helen all day. Anyway, Miss Daisy, as Bill and Helen's Cooper is dubbed, was still voted the best presented MINI with its gleaming chromies, pretty daisies and perfectly reflective deep purple paintwork. It is a credit to both of them.

The Kiewa Valley is another beautiful road in north east Victoria and it winds up the Kiewa Valley with towering mountains flanking its every turn. At Mt Beauty we crossed the range on a switch back road that had our power steering working overtime, stopping briefly at a great lookout over the Kiewa Valley we were soon arriving in the beautiful town of Bright.

Our accommodation tonight was in the High Country Motor Inn and it was superb. The weather was hot, around 30 degrees, clear skies and daylight to 8:30pm allowed plenty of time to wash the cars yet again, refuel, explore the tree lined streets and even relax around the bar in the restaurant.

After another great meal we had a special treat with a visit from two local Cherry Growers who explained how they made cherry wine, cherry sauce, cherry cherries and even seedless cherries. Needless to say we also had the opportunity to sample their wines and cherries and many of us purchased some really fresh fruit at great low prices.

Day 3 saw us make a leisurely start from Bright, the tree lined streets looked even better with a bunch colourful Smarties parked in them. The Parks Victoria attendant at the entrance to Mt Buffalo was impressed with our turn out, but we were blown away by the scenery as we drove up Mt Buffalo. If you have never been to this great location, make sure you see it soon. Chris in the open top Cabrio was beside himself with the scenery, despite his bout of hay fever. We climbed higher and higher with unusual granite rock formations at every turn, the giant Jelly Bean being a favourite. Lunch and shopping in Bright (more eating and spending) was over by 1:30pm and we left this great town for Mt Hotham. The road up the mountain is another classic MINI road, more twists than a politicians promise. A group photo atop the mountains at 1800 metres and then onward through Dinner Plain (sideways glances for more food?)

Driving across a road that is literally moving in front of you is rather interesting, even the Cabrios put their roofs up to keep the little jumpers out. It was a different story at the front and the grille and radiator on MINI2V was inches deep in smelly yellow stuff that seemed to have a myriad legs and heads. I left the cleaning to Julie, which impressed her no end until a local farmer came to her rescue and showed her how real men clean grass hoppers out of grilles. He was also secretly checking out all the brightly coloured Smarties!

Our third night was in the quiet town of Orbost, well it was quiet until we arrived, we certainly know how to fill up the car park in a Motel. The temperatures was in the mid 30s and the now very dusty, and bug splattered MINIs were in a desperate need of a good wash. Fortunately water restrictions do not apply in these parts and we found a hose and stretch of lawn to park under a shady tree and bathe our beauties. It was some time during this exercise that a teeney, weeney, itsey, bitsey spider decided to weave his cobweb across the outlet of my JCW exhaust. Well the sight of a spiders web across my exhaust pipe was too much for some to resist commenting on my ability to 'blow the cobwebs' out of the exhaust and cast dispersions on my driving style!

Another big night in the restaurant, much laughing and hilarity, we soon cleared it other patrons, a good time was had by us!

During the night our fine weather disappeared with a strong southerly blow and we woke to light rain. At Cann River for a short stop to eat and shop, there is definitely a trend here, we were accosted by this fellow with a broad English accent. Turns out that he owns a MINI in England, participates in many club drives in the Home land and was thrilled to bits to see 10 MINIs in, of all places, Cann River. I have since emailed a photo of him and our MINIs to him back in old England town.

which found its way into my Christmas stocking.






